OPEN PG-SIG BOARD POSITIONS

The PG-SIG leadership board has openings for 4 current positions and 2 new positions, Technology Manager and Student Representative for Education. Please see below for descriptions of each position.

To nominate a candidate (must be a PG-SIG member), send an email with the word "Nomination" in the subject line and a brief statement of interest to Lindsey Burrell (<u>Lindsey.Burrell@choa.org</u>) and Cindy Kim (<u>CKim@choc.org</u>). Nominations must be received by Friday, April 16. Self-nominations are encouraged.

Co-Chair Elect

The Chair-elect shall be a member of the PG-SIG who is elected by the membership for a term of 6 years, during which time he/she will serve for 2 years as Chair-elect, Chair, and past-Chair, respectively. As Chair, the individual will lead the PG-SIG by assuming ultimate responsibility for all ongoing programs, leading the development of new directions, maintaining a positive relationship with the parent organization (SPP), speaking for the PG-SIG in personal and public communication, and appointing all committees, liaisons, and other offices of responsibility. S/he shall be the chairperson of the board of directors, preside at all meetings and perform all other usual duties of a presiding officer. Other specific duties include overseeing the planning of PG-SIG activities (e.g., group-sponsored activities at conferences and workshops), organizing the annual meeting for the entire membership to coordinate with the SPP national conference, coordinating quarterly teleconference board meetings, maintaining a dedicated listserv, and overseeing communication with the membership about PG-SIG activities and opportunities through the website, listserv, and newsletters. Several duties begin during the Chair-elect year and extend through the Chair year. The past-Chair leads the committee on nominations and elections and nomination and review committees for several awards among other duties during the final year of the term.

Member at Large, Clinical

The Member at Large, Clinical (MAL-C) shall be a member of the PG-SIG who is appointed by the Chair for a term of 2 years. During his/her term, s/he shall be a member of the PG-SIG board of directors with the right to vote. The MAL-R shall serve as the liaison between members involved in clinical work to the PG-SIG board; work with members involved in clinical activities to strengthen communication and build opportunities for collaboration and mutual learning among these members; be responsible for regularly monitoring publications (including journal manuscripts and books) for relevant information on clinical program development, service provision, billing issues, etc. that may be appropriate for dissemination in the PG-SIG newsletters; work collaboratively with other board members to advance development, knowledge, and use of evidence-based assessment and treatment practices in pediatric gastroenterology conditions.

Member at Large, Education

The Member at Large, Education (MAL-E) shall be a member of the PG-SIG who is appointed by the Chair for a term of 2 years. During his/her term, s/he shall be a member of the PG-SIG board of directors with the right to vote. The primary role of the education board member is to advise the board on educational interests of and opportunities for SIG members. Responsibilities include regular attendance at board meetings, communicating with the membership about opportunities for informal and formal (CE) educational experiences within the SIG, and discussing future opportunities for education (e.g., development of online learning resources, collaboration with other SIG members, and opportunities for students). Future projects will likely include development of an APA video lecture series, online shared resources (e.g., training modules), and a students' online forum.

Student Representative, Education

The Student Representative, Education (Student Rep-E) shall be a student member of the PG-SIG who is appointed by the Chair for a term of 2 years. During his/her term, s/he shall be a member of the PG-SIG board of directors with the right to vote. The primary role of the Student Rep-E is to collaborate with the MAL-E on advising the board on educational interests of and opportunities for SIG members. Responsibilities include regular attendance at board meetings, communicating with the membership about opportunities for informal and formal educational experiences within the SIG, and discussing future opportunities for education (e.g., development of online learning resources,

collaboration with other SIG members, and opportunities for students). Future projects will likely include development of an APA video lecture series, online shared resources (e.g., training modules), and a students' online forum.

Secretary

The Secretary shall be a member of the PG-SIG who is appointed by the chair (or co-chairs) for a term of 2 years. Responsibilities include attending and contributing to remote board conference meetings and the in-person meeting at SPPAC as well as taking minutes of these meetings and distributing minutes to the board. Additionally, the Secretary will create and disseminate the internal and external newsletters of the PG-SIG. This includes editing material compiled by the board and SIG members, ensuring accuracy of board member list and functionality of embedded web links, and formatting the content in a visually appealing manner. The Secretary will also work collaborating with other board members on special projects related to the SIG as they arise.

Technology Manager

The Technology Manager shall be a member or student member of the PG-SIG who is appointed by the chair (or cochairs) for a term of 2 years. During his/her term, s/he shall be a member of the PG-SIG board of directors with the right to vote. Primary responsibilities will involve maintaining the PG website with changes in leadership, board descriptions and adding bi-annual newsletters. The technology manager will also collaborate with the MAL's and Student Representatives to receiving research, clinical, and educational information relevant to PG to add to the website.

The Department of Pediatrics at Columbia University Irving Medical Center is seeking a full-time clinical psychologist to join our team. This position will support both the Division of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology & Nutrition and the Division of Pediatric Allergy & Immunology. The Division of Gastroenterology, Hepatology & Nutrition provides comprehensive outpatient and inpatient care for a broad range of gastrointestinal diseases including disorders affecting the brain-gut axis. The Division of Allergy & Immunology provides outpatient and inpatient services for children diagnosed with allergic diseases of all sorts, including food allergy, as well as immune deficiencies and immune dysregulation. We have robust clinical and research endeavors, crossing genetics, immunology, and clinical science. The clinical psychologist, with a dual appointment in the Departments of Pediatrics (Divisions of Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition and Allergy and Immunology) and Psychiatry, will develop psychosocial and clinical programing, screening, and research within outpatient services. The psychologist will collaborate with multidisciplinary medical, psychiatry consultation-liaison, psychosocial, and integrative therapy teams. Yale Child Study Center Pediatric Psychology Postdoctoral Fellowship

The Yale Child Study Center, in collaboration with Yale New Haven Children's Hospital, is offering a full-time Pediatric Psychology Postdoctoral Fellowship position for the 2021-2022 training year. Clinical training activities will take place within the pediatric floors, our inpatient psychiatric unit, the pediatric emergency room, several ambulatory specialty clinics, and the Child Study Center's outpatient clinical services. Fellows have the option to rotate through GI based on interest. Didactics include: Fellows Seminar, Clinical Supervision, Clinical Supervision, and Departmental Conference.

Application Procedures: 1. Submit a letter of interest, including a description of eligibility for post-doctoral fellowship (i.e. internship completion date, dissertation status). 2. Curriculum Vitae 3. Three letters of reference 4. Written Work Sample: Comprehensive Psychological Assessment Report. Review of applications will begin immediately and continue until the position is filled. The preferred start date is July 1, 2021, with flexibility to start in August.
