Case Example discussed during Clinical Case Conference

Background Information

- 14 yo male living with mother, father, and two younger brothers; brothers and parents have limited food repertoire and oral sensory issues.

- $8^{\rm th}$ and $9^{\rm th}$ grades during treatment, with transition to high school; straight As

- No prior history of therapy or psychotropic medication-

- No significant health issues prior to weight loss

ARFID Assessment

- Had trouble swallowing a chicken nugget when out to eat with family, leading to increased food restriction of variety and amount, slower eating, eating with distraction, oral food manipulation, excessive chewing, acute attention to oral sensations, and refusing to eat out

- Weight loss: 14% of body weight, falling into a BMI< 3%

- Anxiety about choking

- Fear of aversive consequences and sensory subtypes

ARFID Treatment

 Initial focus on weight restoration, followed by goals of faster eating, eating without distraction, eating in public, eating without food manipulation and excessive chewing, and expansion of food variety

- Individual and family treatment components: anxiety management, exposure therapy, working with parent to buy and prepare a greater food variety

- Weekly therapy initially, gradually spacing session to monthly with treatment progress and autonomy, with one year treatment duration

- Made progress on all treatment goals, with complete weight restoration and greater food variety compared with pre-ARFID onset


