OUR INCOMING CO-CHAIRS

At the end of our annual meeting held at the Society of Pediatric Psychology Annual Conference, Amanda Drews Deacy, PhD and Mchele Herzer Maddux, PhD will transition from thier roles a Co-Chair Elects to Co-Chair.

Amanda Drews Deacy, PhD is a licensed psychologist at Children's Mercy Kansas City and an Associate Professor in the Department of Pediatrics, University of Missouri, Kansas City. Dr. Deacy's primary interests are in functional abdominal pain and other chronic physical complaints, the role of anxiety in exacerbating and maintaining these physical difficulties, and acceptance-based approaches to chronic pain treatment. She is one of two psychologists dedicated to the Abdominal Pain Program in the Division of Gastroenterology. This unique interdisciplinary program is staffed by a range of professionals – pediatric gastroenterologists, advanced practice providers (APNs and PAs), psychologists, and biofeedback clinicians – and offers individually-tailored, biopsychosocial care from the point of initial evaluation through follow up. In addition to her clinical responsibilities, Dr. Deacy is involved in program development and research initiatives aimed at clinical outcomes evaluation and community education activities (e.g., outreach to school nurses).

Michele Herzer Maddux, PhD is a licensed psychologist specializing in Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD) at Children's Mercy Kansas City, and Assistant Professor in the Department of Pediatrics, University of Missouri, Kansas City. She splits her time between clinical work, research, and program development, all of this is dedicated programmatically to youth with IBD. Clinically, Dr. Maddux led efforts to develop an Interdisciplinary IBD Team Clinic which provides biopsychosocial care to approximately 500 youth with IBD, starting at time of diagnosis. During a visit to this clinic, patients and parents complete psychosocial questionnaires on the patient's emotional/behavioral functioning, quality of life, and adherence, and are seen by a team which consists of a pediatric gastroenterologist, nurse practitioner, pediatric psychologist (Dr. Maddux), social worker, and a dietician, all of whom are dedicated programmatically to the care of IBD patients.

Dr. Maddux also has an active line of research that is largely focused on adherence to oral medication and transition of care. Currently active projects include an adherence-promoting intervention study for nonadherent youth with IBD, a validation study of a measure designed to evaluate patient/parent knowledge and understanding of their IBD and treatment, and a large longitudinal QI project evaluating the impact of an evolving transition program on various patient outcomes. As Director of Gastroenterology Medical Transition at Children's Mercy-Kansas City, Dr. Maddux is also tasked with providing direction and oversight of GI-specific program patient transition processes.
